

THE LORD'S PRAYER, THE MOST PERFECT PRAYER



It is no surprise that the Lord's Prayer is the most perfect prayer since it was the prayer taught to the apostles by Jesus Himself.

In his work *Praying Like the Early Church*, historian James L. Papandrea writes "(Early) Christians were expected to pray the Our Father from memory, verbatim, because in praying this prayer, we are praying the words of Jesus-it was always understood to be <u>the</u> prayer that the faithful pray."

Saint Cyprian of Carthage (200-258) tells us that the best way to pray in the name of Jesus is to pray in the words of Jesus. Saint Augustine (354-430) wrote that Jesus didn't just teach the Our Father, He dictated it. He said that after the Eucharistic Prayer, the primary Christian prayer is the Our Father, and wrote that "the words which Our Lord Jesus Christ taught us in this prayer are the rule and standard of our desires."

When we pray the Our Father during Mass, do we pray these words with the understanding that they spell out our rules and standards? We have heard Father Burke say "There is no 'my' in the Our Father." Do we realize that we pray this prayer for all those present during Mass, for all Christians everywhere?

In explaining Saint Cyprian's words, Papandrea writes that "when a person prays the Our Father privately as part of his or her personal prayer life, that person is still praying with and for others, especially anyone for whom he or she is responsible. Parents who pray the Our Father are praying for their whole households, especially their children, for their salvation and for their consciences to be formed correctly, and for the forgiveness of their sins." For some of us, that might add more depth to our understanding the importance of this perfect prayer.

A few interesting facts about the Our Father. In Scripture, there are two versions of the Our Father: Luke 11:1-4 and Matthew 6:9-13. Matthew's version is longer, and it was this version that the Church Fathers used when writing their early commentaries.

Another comment would be regarding the phrase added after the Our Father when prayed during Mass- "for the kingdom and the power and the glory are yours, now and forever." This phrase is not in either of Luke's or Matthew's Gospel. A version of this doxology (a liturgical form of prayer and praise) appeared in the Didache (The Lord's Teaching Through the Twelve Apostles) a 1st or 2nd century work that documented teachings of The Twelve, as well as rituals for Baptism and the Eucharistic celebrations. When this phrase was brought back to the Mass after Vatican II many Catholics did not like it because it was thought to be Protestant. It may not be the words of Jesus although the words are in some bibles, but historians see it as part of the earliest Christian liturgical practices taught by the apostles.

After we pray the Our Father at Mass, there comes a gesture that in recent months has created a bit of confusion...the Sign of Peace. Because many of our parishioners were concerned about COVID, we have only recently begun sharing the gesture. In reality, many people get carried away with it. They wave the "peace sign" to parishioners across the aisles, walk around to shake the hand of a friend, and everybody they can stretch to reach. That is not the intent of the gesture. It is a symbolic act to express our connection as a community. And whether you offer a sign of peace or not, when that beautiful prayer "Lamb of God, who takes away the sins of the world, have mercy on us", begins, we should be ready to sing that song with a heart-felt request for God's mercy.
