


Next Week Is the Feast of Christ the King of the Universe (From The Catholic Company website)

The early 20th century saw great destruction, tyranny, and corruption. Recognizing this profound need, in 1925 Pope Pius XI wrote the encyclical *Quas Primas* ("In the first") in response. This encyclical addressed the reality of Christ's kingship over the entire world and instituted the feast of Christ the King of the Universe. He recognized that attempting to "thrust Jesus Christ and his holy law" out of public life would result in continuing discord among people and nations. This solemnity reminds us that while governments come and go, Christ reigns as King forever.

The feast of Christ the King is celebrated on the last Sunday of the liturgical calendar, closing out each liturgical year with the hopeful reminder that Christ will always reign. This year, the feast of Christ the King will be celebrated on Sunday, November 24th. Since the feast of Christ the King occurs right before the Advent season, it also serves as a profound reminder to keep Christ as King of our hearts and to use the upcoming weeks as prayerful preparation to make our hearts fit for such a King.

Keep Christ enthroned in your homes and hearts.

There are many ways to explain the Kingship of Jesus Christ. In preparation for this feast of Christ the King of the Universe on next Sunday, Bishop Sheen's words give us something to think about.



"Are You the King of the Jews?"

One charge worried Pilate slightly. Was this Prisoner before him a king? Pilate summoned Our Lord inside the house. Once in the judgment hall, Pilate asked "Are you the King of the Jews?"

The charge was only that He was a king. Pilate knew that if Christ was setting Himself up as a rival king to the Romans, the Gentiles would be there to testify against Him. So he asked if He were King of the Jews. Our Lord in answer to the question penetrated the conscience of Pilate; He asked him if he was saying that because his suspicions had be aroused by the false charge of His enemies. Pilate had expected a direct answer. Our Lord now made clear a that distinction had to be made between a political and religious kingship; political kingship, which was the only interest Pilate had in the case, the Master rejected; religious Kingship which meant that He was the Messiah, Our Lord admitted. To the skeptical Pilate, Our Blessed Lord had to make clear that His Kingship was not that of an earthly kingdom obtained by military power; it was rather a spiritual Kingdom to be established in truth. He would have only moral subjects, not political ones; He would reign in hearts, not in armies.

"My Kingdom does not belong to this world. If My Kingdom

did belong to this world, My attendants would be fighting to keep me from being handed over to the Jews; but as it is, My Kingdom is not here." (John 18:36)

Pilate's worry about a challenge to Roman power was, for the moment, put at ease. Christ's Kingdom was not of this world; therefore He was not like Judas the Galilean, the son of Ezechias, who had led the rebellion against Rome a few decades before by inciting the people not to pay taxes. Pilate may have heard that the night before when Peter had argued with his sword, Our Lord had reprimanded the wielder of the weapon and had healed the injured man. If His Kingdom were of the world, Our Lord argued, He would need the help of armies of men; but a Heavenly Kingdom was sufficient unto itself, for its power came from above. His Kingdom was in the world, but not of it.

The quiet and dignified bearing of the One before him, so helplessly bound with ropes-His face marred with the beatings after the first trial, His assertion that His Kingdom was not of this world, that He had servants who would not use the sword, and that He was to establish a Kingdom without fighting-all this puzzled Pilate, who changed his question. The first time Pilate had asked, "Are You the King of the Jews?" Now he asked "Then You are a King?"

The religious trial centered on Christ the Prophet, the Messiah, the Son of God. The civil trial revolved about His Kingship. Strange how the Gentiles were associated with Christ under this royal title! The Magi at His birth asked where the King was born; it was the imperial edict of Caesar that fulfilled the prophecy of Micha that He would be born in Bethlehem.

Pilate, satisfied that Christ was not a political Rival, in wonderment prodded a little deeper into His Kingly claim. Our Lord, having already avowed His Kingly state, acknowledged the inference which Pilate had somewhat scornfully drawn and answered:

"You say I am a King. For this I was born and for this I came into the world, to testify to the truth. Everyone who belongs to the truth listens to My voice." (John 18:37)

We All Need Marthas

We all need a "Martha". It's true. Someone has to take on the physical management of a home in real life—the cooking, cleaning, caring, and serving. And sometimes we see that the "Martha" could be a father and husband, or even a child who assumes that responsibility. But let's just acknowledge that we all need "Marthas" in our life.

Now we know from Luke 10:38-42 that of the two sisters, Mary and Martha, Jesus said that Mary chose the better portion, sitting at the Master's feet, listening to what Jesus had to say. Martha was serving the people in the house. Because Jesus travelled with his followers, one can only imagine the work that Martha had to do. Still, Jesus said that Mary chose the better part.

But consider this commentary by Saint Gregory the Great. He wrote that in his opinion, Martha signifies the active life as she busily labors to honor Christ through her work. Mary exemplifies the contemplative life as she sits attentively to listen and learn from Christ. Both activities are essential for Christian living.

That leads us to a topic that lives in the heart of our parish...the Ladies Guild. And here's a little secret about the Ladies. They can do the things they do **because** they are filled to overflowing with the gifts that God has shared with them. That's why they can share these gifts with the rest of us.

The Ladies Guild of Immaculate Conception Parish is filled with women like that. It's a good thing too, because the Parish needs them. Why? Because there is a need to help our fellow parishioners in many ways. Our parish community is a busy one, and

the hearts of the ladies in the Ladies Guild are sometimes stretched pretty thin.

A perfect example is a recent funeral luncheon. These luncheons are one of the most important undertakings of the Ladies Guild (LG). A few years ago there would have been 15-20 ladies helping to set up, serve, clean up before and after each event. At a recent luncheon, there were only 8, and this was not the luncheon held right after Hurricane Helene. To provide a much appreciated corporal work of mercy, to bury the dead, it takes a lot of effort. As LG members age, they may not be as able to do the full-day of work to set up, deliver, and clean up the luncheon. After all, clean-up alone takes two hours! And let's not talk about laundering the tablecloths!

So, we need help, and not just for funeral luncheons. The LG sees to the seasonal and special event decorations in the chapel and the church. A sub-group of the LG is the Prayer Shawl Ministry. In the last three years they have provided over 90 prayer shawls, lapghans and afghans to members of our parish family. The LG Bake Sales help to bring in the needed funds to help with parish projects. With the Knights of Columbus, they provide simple meals before Stations of the Cross during Lent. The LG also sends out 'thinking of you' cards to the homebound, as well as birthday cards.

Going out on a limb here, and making a guess, the average age of the LG members is around 73. Several are in their late 80s, while others are in their 50s. Some of the members have raised families, retired from successful careers outside the home, and have successfully completed the struggles of personal and professional growth. After all that, they have found the time to



spread their wings of faith and found the time to volunteer. Add up all the talent and experience among these valiant and hard-working women, it is a certainty that there value in God's eyes is immeasurable.

Here are a few things you might not already know about the LG. First of all, every woman in our parish is a member. Here are a few other points that are worth mentioning.

Meetings are held monthly, September through May, on the second Monday of the month, at 10:00am. Many of the ladies attend the 9am mass before the meeting because the LG members treasure their relationship with Christ. **NOTE: Meeting attendance is not required**.

At the LG meetings, we frequently hear that we would like to get more younger members. That isn't always possible if you are a mom who is homeschooling the children, or working outside the home to help support the family. But there are a lot of other ways that you can help support the work of the LG. Here are a few examples.

One home-schooling mom gets three of her sons together and they set up tables for funeral luncheons and special events like Confirmation and First Communion.

Another mom knits prayer shawls when the children go to sleep and brings them to the prayer shawl team.



Other women help out by baking desserts for the LG bake sales and funeral luncheons. The luncheons, in particular, are often last-minute events, and their culinary efforts are so much appreciated. The same thing goes for hot entrees and salads for these luncheons, as well as for the pre-Christmas bake sale/frozen entrée sale.



The point is, Marthas are multidimensional, talented women. They have to be.

The secret here, or maybe it isn't really a secret, is that our parish "Marthas" are able to give because they have already been filled by God with many gifts. And while Martha's may be "anxious and troubled by many things" as Jesus said in Bethany, they are generous with those gifts because they are filled with the Holy Spirit.

There is a little piece of prose that goes this way...

There are women who make things better...simply by showing up.

There are women who make things happen.

There are women who make their way.

There are women who make a difference.

And women who make us smile.

There are women of wit and wisdom who, through strength and courage make it through.

There are women who change the world every day...

Women like you!

We Need YOUR Help!

Over the years we have seen by experience that people are willing to help when there is a need, when they know how, and when they are asked.

The Ladies Guild is asking a big favor of our parishioners. Several years ago (and some of you might remember this), a member of the LG would call parishioners and ask if they would make an entrée, salad, or dessert for an "after the funeral Mass" luncheon for the family of a parishioner who had died. These luncheons have always been one of the most important gifts we can share with each other. It helps relieve a little pressure from a grieving family

In recent years, the calling has not happened. Sadly, the dear person who did the calling passed away after a long fight with cancer. But since her faithful service worked so well, the LG is bringing it back.

A member of the LG has volunteered to be "The Caller". She will call the people on an established volunteer list. **Note: The numbers on this list will not be shared with other committees, just the Funeral Luncheon Committee.**

When a date and time has been set for a funeral luncheon, "The Caller" will get to work calling on the parishioners who have volunteered to be on this list. The turn-around time is usually only a few days so sometimes the donor won't have much notice to make something to share. But please...help the Ladies Guild, and your fellow parishioners with this very important ministry.
